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



#### We shall remember them

Around 60 people attended this year's Remembrance service in St Michael's churchyard on November 9. Conducted by Lay Reader Elaine Corbett, it included a hymn and the national anthem as well as prayers and a moving reflection.

David Lyon read aloud the names of those from the Wildbrooks parishes who died in both World Wars, and also the Kohima Epitaph (which is engraved on the Memorial of the 2nd British Division in the Kohima cemetery in northeast India). Captain Iain Miskimmin, of the Royal Engineers, read the "They shall not grow old" extract from war poet Laurence Binyon's The Fallen, and Ollie Clifford sounded the Last Post on the bugle prior to the two-minute silence, followed by the Reveille. Wreaths were laid by David Lyon, and by Tim Simpson on behalf of Amberley Parish Council.

Tea and coffee were served after the service and there was a collection for the Royal British Legion.



## New Same Day Emergency Care unit opens at Chichester

St Richard's Hospital has opened a new Same Day Emergency Care (SDEC) unit, revolutionising urgent care. Backed by a £6 million investment from University Hospitals Sussex, the facility provides same-day diagnosis and treatment by a multi-specialty team, reducing overnight stays and long waits.

Lead consultant Dr Neal Gent calls it "a game-changer," with over 300 patients seen weekly.

The new SDEC is ten times larger than its predecessor, featuring 18 clinical spaces, an open-plan design, and operating from 8am-10pm. It handles medical, surgical, urological, and orthopaedic cases, including chest pain, cellulitis, and abdominal issues, with referrals from GPs or hospital teams. Future upgrades include an Urgent Treatment Centre and an Acute Stroke Centre by 2027.

#### Festive talks

Festive season subjects are in store for members of the local Arts Societies attending this month's lectures.

Star of Wonder, Star of Light: New Evidence for the Star of Bethlehem is the intriguing title of the talk on December 2 for the West Sussex group. The real 'Star' did exist, but what it was and where it shone has been taken on trust for two thousand years. In fact, it aligns perfectly with prophesies in the Old Testament and the astrological readings of the Magi. The talk is at 2pm with coffee and tea afterward. # What your councillors discussed



#### Highlights of the meeting held on November 11, 2025 at the Old School, Rackham

**Present:** Will Rydon (acting chair), Catherine Dugdale, Paul Slimming, Philippa Trumper, Claudia Fisher and Nigel Dean Also in attendance: Vicky Spiers (parish clerk) and one member of the public.

Parham Parish Council convened its latest meeting with a busy agenda, addressing matters ranging from local infrastructure to planning applications and community initiatives.

Claudia Fisher opened proceedings with news from Horsham District Council (HDC). She announced the formation of the Rural & Market Town Alliance, a collaborative effort aimed at strengthening ties between rural communities. The alliance will include Billingshurst, Pulborough, Storrington, Steyning and Henfield. Its first initiative – a community toilet scheme – will see local establishments opening their facilities for public use, improving amenities for residents and visitors alike.

In a sombre moment, Fisher reported the passing of Helen Peacock, a long-standing HDC employee. The council expressed its condolences and instructed the clerk to send a formal message of sympathy.

Attention then turned to road safety. Councillors discussed a response from West Sussex County Council's Traffic Engineering Lead, Matt Gray, regarding a proposed Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) for the B2139. After deliberation, members agreed to apply for a reduction in the speed limit from 60mph to 50mph. The clerk was asked to contact residents who had previously supported a 40mph limit to confirm their backing for the revised proposal — a task acknowledged as time-consuming but necessary.

The meeting also addressed a blocked drain and ditch along Rackham Street. West Sussex Highways confirmed that no council-maintained drains exist on that stretch, suggesting the issue may lie with a landowner failing to meet riparian responsibilities. Councillors resolved to arrange a site meeting with the parishioner who raised the concern.

On vegetation management, the hedge at Pine Cottage has been cut back, but an overgrown hedge in Greatham remains problematic. Highways officials deemed it below the threshold for urgent action, a view councillors strongly contested. The clerk will photograph the site and escalate the matter. Catherine Dugdale highlighted safety concerns, noting branches protruding into the carriageway, forcing drivers towards the centre of the road.

The clerk presented the council's budget, which members

approved without amendment. A notable update came from HDC regarding the council tax base, which has risen significantly for Parham. The increase stems from five properties incurring a 300 per cent levy after standing empty for over a decade. As a result, the parish precept can remain unchanged for the coming year.

Among the planning applications discussed was a proposal for The Parlour in Greatham Lane seeking to convert stables, a tack room and an office into short-term holiday accommodation. Councillors questioned whether a 2014 planning condition prohibited such use and asked the clerk to investigate. Claudia Fisher raised ecological concerns, citing a February bat survey that found brown long-eared bats, yet the accompanying report lacked mitigation measures. Members agreed this omission must be addressed. Additionally, councillors noted the design includes multiple skylights and windows, with no reference to the South Downs National Park Authority's Dark Skies policy.

The council expressed no objection to new toilet facilities at the RSPB centre in Wiggonholt but recommended a pitched roof to match surrounding buildings, rather than the proposed flat design.

Members noted that the South Downs National Park Authority no longer issues notifications of tree works within the parish. The clerk will seek clarification on this policy change.

Finally, councillors agreed meeting dates for 2026: January 20, March 10, May 12, July 14, September 8 and November 10.

**Date of the next meeting:** January 20 (to be confirmed) at 7.30pm in the Old School, Rackham.

#### Food waste collections

Food waste collections are coming to the Wildbrooks parishes. Horsham District Council will be adding weekly food waste recycling collections to your bin collections from next spring.

Collections are due to start from March. Your refuse and recycling collections will continue as usual every other week; these new food waste collections are an additional service.

Households will be advised in January about how the service will work, with delivery of starter packs from February, including a 23-litre grey bin with an orange lockable lid, a 5-litre internal kitchen caddy, an instruction leaflet and a roll of liners to get everyone started.

Once collected food waste will be transported, in bulk, to the Horsham Anaerobic Digestion Plant, operated on behalf of West Sussex County Council.

#### **Eco Hub and Repair Cafe**

There will be no Amberley Eco Hub and Repair Cafe in December but it will resume in the New Year on Saturday, January 10 from 10am until 1230pm.



#### **Amberley Parish Council**

#### Highlights of the meeting held on November 13, 2025 in St Michaels Church Hall

A broad range of subjects, ranging from planning applications and infrastructure improvements to financial decisions and community initiatives were discussed by councillors..

The meeting opened with a review of planning issues currently under consideration. These included restoration works at Amberley Museum, alterations to Kennards on Hog Lane, and tree works at Amberley Cottage and Old Ale House. Lee Cresswell, chair of the planning committee will write to the South Downs National Park Authority to clarify the position regarding The Black Horse.

Reports on infrastructure confirmed that drains along the B2139 near The Cricketers had been cleared and hedges bordering footpaths were being cut back. The village pond was reported to be showing signs of recovery, with grass growth and rising water levels noted. although UK Power Networks were unable to encase exposed cabling until stream levels fall in spring. The Clerk would meet a contractor to address issues raised in the recent Ro-SPA playground inspection, and the asset register remained unchanged as no updates were received from councillors.

Work continued on the business plan required for the transfer of the car park asset from Horsham District Council, and the clerk hoped to submit details shortly. Meanwhile, the village bus service remains suspended pending essential repairs [subsequently resolved and back in service within a few days]. The bus committee was formalising its structure, and new safety notices would be installed inside the vehicle.

The Speedwatch group reported that reduced daylight hours had limited monitoring sessions, but plans were in place to publish more data, explore noise-monitoring equipment, liaise with police on acoustic cameras, and distribute leaflets to raise awareness.

The meeting welcomed Mike Attard who had been co-opted as a councillor. The council's resilience plan was expected to circulate for comments before January's meeting, and Horsham District Council had removed a rogue bin from the car park and a dumpy bag from the recreation ground. Water neutrality restrictions imposed by West Sussex County Council and Natural England were discussed, with councillors noting that time will reveal the full impact. Revised policies will be shared in advance over the coming months.

The clerk addressed complaints against him received earlier in the year, confirming that one had been dismissed and three were not upheld, and noted a petition signed by a small number of parishioners. Correspondence regarding local government reorganisation has been answered with a comprehensive update. Operation Watershed works in the Piggery middle and top fields, as well as east of Newlands Gardens, were now complete.

Financial matters were also addressed, with the council approving bank reconciliations for September and October, along with the 2025/26 budget and precept. A 16% increase was confirmed, and a letter explaining the reasons would be sent to parishioners. While the Financial Committee's recommendations were accepted, additional allowances proposed by the clerk were rejected.

Several key resolutions were agreed during the meeting. The decommissioned telephone kiosk in Amberley Square will be adopted, with a community survey to determine its future use. Meeting dates for 2026/27 were confirmed, and the Nature Recovery/ Climate Change Committee will continue under the new name of the Nature & Environment Committee, chaired by Mike Attard.

Financial regulation changes were approved to expedite payments within budget, and a softwood option for the bus stop opposite The Sportsman was

agreed, with the clerk overseeing its installation.

Councillors also adopted NALC policies on staff grievance, discipline, and complaints, alongside the Civility & Respect pledge, and agreed to form a complaints and appeals panel.

Tree Warden responsibilities will transfer to the Nature & Environment Committee, with thanks extended to outgoing warden Pam Keeble. A South Downs National Park Authority grant for pond planting will now be used behind Newlands Gardens, subject to approval.

Residents raised several questions during the adjournment, including queries on the budget increase, pond planting species, and tree maintenance on the football field. The clerk confirmed that all pond species were native and approved by Natural England, and the chair assured that tree maintenance would be addressed soon.

Councillors also agreed to the formation of a staffing committee in principle.

### Rewilding: getting the balance right for the public good

#### Michael Finnigan, who grew up in Amberley and spent a lifetime involved in agriculture, reflects on the pros and cons of rewilding

Our British countryside has evolved since creation and continues to do so, responding to geologic and climatic conditions which have allowed plant and animal species to evolve taking greatest advantage of opportunities presented. As conditions have changed, species have thrived, then sometimes declined and vanished in response to different conditions over time. Interactions between species have, in their turn, changed the composition of the landscape. In the last two or three centuries the rate of change has gathered pace, largely as a result of human activity, and changes are more apparent when they happen over a shorter time scale.

Rewilding is about removing human influence, and letting natural factors reshape the landscape, seemingly to return to a landscape which existed before the industrial revolution, and to reintroduce species which were able to exist in that environment, a reintroduction which in itself constitutes human interference on a massive scale.

It is hard to see how an ecosystem which existed when much of the country was effectively unaffected by human interference; and when the UK population was around six million, is relevant in a country which now has a population well over ten times that and growing rapidly. And a country which is only 62 per cent self-sufficient in food production at a time when the vulnerability of the global supply chain is demonstrated with alarming frequency. Re-introducing species which died out centuries ago into limited areas will result in isolated communities which will require continuing human management to survive in a re-created environment not natural to our time.

The management of land for conservation purposes offers opportunities to create favourable conditions for species, present or recently lost, under threat from changing agricultural practices. Deciding when land can be taken out of production and given to conservation management must take into account land quality. Taking our most productive land, which could be farmed in a sustainable and eco-friendly manner, out of production results in us having to import more food from countries which frequently lack our strict controls over environmental harm, and cause further environmental damage during food transportation.

There are many state and private initiatives which help and encourage land managers to continue to farm, but in ways compatible with environmental protection. Sometimes, but by no means always, this can be done at no cost. But we do need to recognise that incentives will be needed to encourage management practices for the public good, which are not always compatible with the need to produce our food at a price we are prepared to pay.

# **AMBERLEY PARISH TRUST Annual Report for 2024/25**

The Trust was set up in 1999 to ensure the provision of a village shop in Amberley. We do this through the vehicle of Amberley Shop Properties Ltd, a company wholly owned by the Trust, which has a 999-year lease of the shop premises. These are in turn leased to Colin Woods and Lee Stace who run the shop and Post Office as an independent business.

Trust income comprises rental from the shop and returns from an investment fund, the latter established through the generosity of local donors and a significant bequest from the late Bill Smith, a life-long resident. In the year ending 31st March 2025 Amberley Shop Properties Ltd, made an overall loss of £22,004 compared with a profit in the previous year of £52,345. This reflects changes in the value of the investment portfolio and support grants made to the Village Store in excess of rents received. The performance of the investment portfolio always reflects market conditions. However, these investments have shown a compounding return of 6 per cent over the past 15 years, and are currently performing better than last year.

On the 31st March 2025 shareholder's funds (owned by the Trust) including the value of the shop's lease, amounted to £524,650.

In the last year the Trust made the following grants to help maintain the Village store, totalling £3,085. This included: Post Office support of £2,640, advertising of £370, and repairs of £75.

The objective of the Trust is to ensure the long-term provision of a Village Shop. The Trust increasingly believes that in the future this will be best achieved by linking together other assets in the village around a Community Centre. The Trust is actively working alongside Amberley Parish Council and others to find a suitable site to accommodate this.

Colin recently gave the Trustees a frank overview of the many challenges that Lee and he face running a village shop in a constantly changing retail market. They and their small team, work very hard to provide an important service for our community and we for our part all need to support them by shopping at the store and Post Office whenever possible.

Amberley Parish trustees are Mrs A Garrity, Mr P Greenwood, Mr S Hoy, Mr J Feakins and Mr D Vokins. Mrs S Conlon is secretary to both the company and the Trust.

#### A fond farewell to Wendy Huggins - Amberley's secret painter

We all know Wendy for her warmth, charming conversation and for her unwavering support of Amberley's charities and fundraising efforts. But behind closed doors. 

#### The 'Ghost Owl'

Scanning the Wildbrooks at dusk you glimpse a pale creature slowly and silently quartering the riverbank – a barn owl is out hunting.

The barn owl is primarily nocturnal but can sometimes be seen at dusk and at dawn. Its flight appears effortless, and its specially adapted feathers muffle any noise ensuring it can hunt silently. It is the brilliant white under-



The sound-absorbing feathers are not the only adaptation the barn owl has to enable it to hunt and find its prey - largely mice and voles – in the pitch darkness. The heart-shaped face of the owl helps to concentrate and focus the squeaks and tiny footsteps of small mammals towards the bird's ears, essentially acting like a sound dish. Try this out yourself by cupping your hands behind your ears and seeing how much more you can hear.

The ears themselves are positioned asymmetrically on the side of the owl's head with one slightly higher than the other. This arrangement helps to pinpoint the exact location of the unseen prey due to the minute time difference in the sound reaching each ear. The barn owl then dives into the long grass, talons outstretched to seize its unsuspecting supper.

The breeding success of barn owls is strongly influenced by their food supply so is dependent on both weather and populations of their prey species. The barn owl is not well adapted to the rain and struggles to hunt in poor weather conditions as its feathers get waterlogged. They will lay their eggs one by one over a series of days leaving them on a bed of their pellets – the regurgitated fur, feathers and bones - and start incubation.

This staggered approach to egg-laying means that when the chicks hatch their can be a significant difference in their ages (and therefore size). If the food supply is a little meagre, it is not unusual for the older larger chicks to eat their siblings - a bit gruesome but this makes good sense at a species level as it ensures that at least one chick survives to fledging. It seems remarkable that such ugly owlets somehow grow up to be such beautiful owls.

Sadly, barn owls in Sussex experienced one of the worst breeding seasons in decades in 2025. Monitoring by the Sussex Barn Owl Group found a significant drop in chick numbers, with just 28 ringed, compared to 224 in 2024. Researchers are analysing owl pellets to investigate the cause, but the poor breeding season is likely due to a food

#### Our neglected oceans

December has a real indoors vibe. Short days, finishing work in the dark and inconsistent weather doesn't exactly motivate us to get out, even if we know it's good for us.

This poses a challenge for connecting with wildlife, which we know can increase people's desire to protect the natural world. Despite many species hibernating or migrating, there is still so much to see. To throw yourself in at the deep end, figuratively speaking, I encourage you this winter to explore our beautiful Sussex coast. That said, in reviewing my par-



ish magazine articles of this year, I realise I've not included any marine species. This is awkward. If our marine team find out they'll be livid. But also, we work hard to connect people with blue spaces, promote the value and wonder of the ocean and fight for its protection, so how could I have overlooked it?

The marine environment has long since suffered from a lack of attention in the conservation world and beyond despite the fact oceans account for around 70 per cent of the world's surface. At the risk of sounding like I'm defending myself, in a way it's understandable. We're terrestrial mammals, desperately under-resourced for the aquatic. We seek warmth, dryness, a firm foundation underfoot, and can align more easily with perils of the warm-blooded – and things with a face.

Many of us value coastal connections: beach trips, swimming, travel to warmer waters. But our oceans are not a luxury. They are a lifeline. A critical feature of our eco-system, which we and all other life on earth could not survive without. Our disconnect with the ocean environment is con-

tributing to its demise, and we must turn it around.

There is something fascinating about the unknown of the big blue, and once you start to investigate, you realise how truly epic it is. Although much is out of sight from land, the diversity of healthy UK waters has such colour and vibrancy, from royal blue lobsters to 90s-neon corkwing wrasse, and other-wordly nudibranchs.

In winter it's wild. The drama of furious waters, crashing waves and freezing sea-spray. Watching, huddled in layers, a freezing cold nose and the promise of an after winter-walk's too-hot-yet chips. Heading to the water's edge for stone-sprinkled sand and shell treasure discoveries. And there's nothing like a stomp along a windswept beach to galvanise a slumped after-Christmas-dinner bunch.

So, this December, why not skip a shopping trip, dodge the odd social occasion, push that deadline. Instead, head to the sea.

#### RECIPE

## Apple Mincemeat Filo Pie (Pastis Gascon)

Hidden inside this crispy, buttery filo pie is a delicately sweet apple and mincemeat filling with a boozy kick. This makes the perfect light dessert after a festive feast. Pastis Gascon is a fundamentally rustic yet flouncy French apple pie that's soft and mildly boozy on the inside and shatteringly crisp on the outside from the use of filo pastry. It's the kind of low-fuss, relatively light dessert that is perfect for using up any leftover mincemeat once Christmas has passed.

#### Ingredients

For the filling

- 1 Bramley cooking apple, peeled, quartered and cored
- 2 Pink Lady apples, peeled, quartered and cored

Juice of 1/2 lemon

Around 140g (4½ oz) mincemeat (give or take)

- 1 tbsp caster (superfine) or granulated sugar, plus extra for sprinkling
- 3 tbsp Armagnac (or brandy)

#### To assemble

6–7 filo (phyllo) pastry sheets 85g (3½oz) butter, melted

To serve icing (confectioners') sugar crème fraîche

#### **Essential kit**

You will need: 30cm (12in) round pie dish

#### Method

Preheat the oven to 170°C fan/190°C/375°F/gas 5. Place a baking tray in the oven to heat up. Thinly slice the apple quar-

ters crossways and place in a medium bowl. Squeeze over the lemon juice, then add the rest of the filling ingredients and toss together.

To assemble the pie, cover the filo sheets with a slightly damp dish towel while you work, so that they don't dry out. Brush the pie dish with a thin layer of the melted butter, sprinkle with a teaspoon of sugar, then add a sheet of filo to the bottom of the tin, letting any excess overhang. Brush this filo layer with more butter and sprinkle with more sugar, then place a second sheet of filo over the top, rotating it slightly so that the excess hangs out at a different angle. Repeat with 2 more layers of filo.

Fill the pie dish with the apple mincemeat mixture, leaving any excess liquid behind in the bowl. Lay a sheet of filo on your work surface, brush with the melted butter, sprinkle with a teaspoon of sugar and scrunch it up, then arrange it on top of half of the pie (if your sheets are really big, then you may choose to halve them). Repeat with another sheet of filo, placing this on the other half, creating a full pie 'lid' and tucking in any overhang, like a messy bedsheet. Drizzle any remaining melted butter over the top.

Place the pie on the preheated baking tray and bake until the pastry is cooked through and golden brown, around 45 minutes. (Check it halfway through the cooking time and turn the oven down to 160°C fan/180°C/350°F/gas 4 if the pastry looks as though it's getting dark quite quickly.)

Allow the pie to cool for 15 minutes before serving warm, dusted lightly with icing sugar and with a spoonful of crème fraîche alongside.

This is best served with tangy French crème fraîche (or sour cream), but cold double (heavy) cream is also lovely.



#### **EDITORIAL**

#### **Division and discontent**

The official minutes of Amberley Parish Council's November meeting read like a model of calm efficiency. Yet behind the bland record lies a very different reality: an astonishing outburst by the parish clerk lasted nearly fifteen minutes and required the intervention of the CEO of the West Sussex Association of Local Councils, who happened to be at the meeting. It was an extraordinary moment – but not an isolated one. This dispute has been simmering for months.

The current clerk, who took over earlier this year from Vicky Spiers – a respected figure who served for a decade without controversy – has, to put it mildly, ruffled feathers. Some long-standing volunteers have walked away. Two councillors have resigned. These are not minor tremors; they are signs of a deeper fault line in the way the council is being run.

Let us be clear: no one questions the clerk's competence or ability to get things done. Efficiency is not the issue. The problem lies in approach and attitude. Parish clerks are appointed to serve councils, not to run them. Yet, by all accounts, this distinction has blurred. Some describe the clerk's manner as arrogant; others see it as an overreach of authority. Whatever the label, the effect is the same division and discontent.

The minutes note that four complaints were lodged against the clerk: one dismissed, three not upheld. Technically, that clears the slate. But the fact these complaints were raised at all speaks volumes. Add to that a petition – dismissed because it was signed by "a small number of parishioners" – and the picture becomes harder to ignore. These are not isolated grumbles; they point to a growing unease about governance and respect.

As someone who has lived in Amberley for forty years, I cannot recall a time when the parish felt so fractured over council affairs. This is not about personalities; it is about principles. Our elected representatives owe it to the community to confront this issue head-on. Silence and procedural niceties will not heal the rift. Leadership will.

Amberley deserves a council that works with unity and transparency, not one mired in internal conflict. The time for hoping this blows over has passed. It is time to act.





## The Ego has landed

A parish clerk's job should be to oil the wheels at council meetings, working cheerfully and competently in the background to ensure the agenda flows smoothly, so discussion can focus on issues that really matter to members of the community. Yet there was no wheel oiling at the Amberley Parish Council meeting last month – rather, the clerk took it upon himself to thrust a stick in the spokes of the wheels. The meeting ground to a halt and descended into a level of chaos not seen since the Handforth Parish Council lockdown special ('you have no authority here, Jackie Weaver').

The clerk increasingly shouted and cut across people – and suddenly he turned the conversation to himself...council members had disrespected his role and he needed to defend his position...he wanted mediation...a 'staffing committee' was to be set up (Really? For one staff member?), yet he felt 'uncomfortable' with certain councillors sitting on that committee. Things became so heated that Trevor Leggo, CEO of the West Sussex Association of Local Councils, also in attendance, had to intervene to close down the discussion, saying he had "never seen such an argumentative clerk" and suggesting disciplinary action may be appropriate.

The clerk's extraordinary outburst followed some individual letters of complaint and a petition from 32 villagers about the inappropriateness of his conduct and behaviour across a range of issues. There have also been three resignations from volunteer positions in the village, since the clerk's appointment.

As the old adage goes – once is an accident, twice is a coincidence and three times is a trend that needs to be monitored and managed. There is no doubt that the clerk knows his onions – his knowledge of process, procedures and the nature of council business is clearly excellent – but his overbearing tone and the lack of respect he shows others is not a good fit for many kind and gentle Amberley parishioners and volunteers. Let's hope we see some monitoring and managing so that our parish council meetings are never again dominated by one person's ego and vanity.



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
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
